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12/05/2002 Coyote Reservoir Photos

I arrived at the lake at about 5PM. It was a moonless partly cloudy night with no wind as usual. I started out a lookout throwing a jig/mad man. After a half dozen casts I got a slack-line bite. I reeled fast but by the time I caught up with my jig the fish had dropped it. So I shook the jig a few times and the fish thunked it a second time. I reeled down to set but AGAIN the fish had dropped it by the time I got the slack out of my line. I threw the jig for another 20 minutes or so without any more hits. Next I decided to start covering water with a 9 inch Slammer. After 10 minutes of casting a dink unloaded on it. Fifteen minutes later a 5.1 lber fell for it, and then a 3.8 lber a few minutes after. Twenty minutes later I made a long cast off a point and a fish made a giant explosion under my plug with literally 2 feet of line out. The fish didn't find any hooks but it did manage to scare some raccoons out of a nearby garbage can. I flipped the plug out a few more times close to shore but the fish wouldn't come back for it. So I continued down the bank. But when I had walked a little ways down I made a long cast backwards over the same spot where the fish had blown up. The fish hit the plug again and this time hooked up good. The fish was a hog at 10.2 pounds. Since I seemed to be having pretty good luck so far on bare nothing banks I decided to continue walking all the way past the boat ramp down south just covering water. But in the next 40 minutes I just missed one slurp. At about 7PM Rob joined me and we moved over to the points area. We fished it hard with Slammers, jigs and blades. Rob got one small hit on the slammer, otherwise it was just shut off. Next we tried the dam. On the first half Rob finally hooked up to a little fish on the Slammer and missed a boil. On the second half I dumped a Slammer fish in the 5 lb range and missed a good hit. Next we fished a little of the shoreline near the dam but didn't get any more hits. We left at about midnight.

11/30/2002 Coyote Reservoir

Fished tonight from about 4:30-9:30PM. It was a nice looking cool overcast night. But still dead calm. I started at lookout with the jig/mad man. Nothing. Next the dam. I fished this with a weightless brush hog. Nothing. Next the points area. I switched up to a 9 in Slammer here. After a half hour of casting a big fish whacked it. But after 15 seconds of wallowing the fish came unbuttoned. When I got my lure back the hooks were tangled and my line was wrapped around them. It doesn't get much worse than that. That fish probably would've gone 7-9lbs. For the next couple hours I threw the Slammer but nothing ever came of it.

11/29/2002 Coyote Reservoir Photos

I kickboated Coyote this afternoon from about 11AM-3PM. The weather

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was warm and calm. I threw just two baits today, a pumpkin seed jig/mad man and a brush hog. I threw the jig the entire time but occasionally let the brush hog drag behind me in my rod holder. My first bite was in some deep brush on the jig, but the fish didn't hold on. That was pretty much it for the trip. Around 2 PM I pretty much gave up and rowed back to my truck at lookout. But before loading up my kickboat I made a few more casts and stuck a 4.2 pounder on the jig up shallow. With a little renewed confidence I worked the area for another half hour or so but didn't get anything more.

11/27/2002 Covote Reservoir Photos

I fished Coyote from about a half hour after sunset until about 10 PM. I got a good number of bites, but my jinx from last trip has definitely held on. I landed one fish at 5.4 lbs on a quasi-jig. Dumped one at the bank about 3 lbs, lost one half way to the bank, broke one off on the hookset, set hard into a few but didn't hook up, and just plain missed 2-3 other bites. I think I got most the ways to not catch a fish covered. All but one were on jigs/plastics, the 3lber on blades. I couldn't get anything to play with the Slammer.

11/24/2002 Coyote Reservoir

I launched my kickboat and started fishing at about 1PM. It was dead calm again when I launched, so I didn't pack my swimbaits. But of course as soon as I crossed the lake it got windy and it stayed cool and breezy all day. I pretty much worked from the pt across from the ramp north a few hundred yards and back again. I worked slow enough so that took me all afternoon. I dragged plastics, pitched jigs, and cranked. I didn't even get a sniff on the way north. On the way back I had two hookups. On the first one I was dragging a brush hog behind my kickboat on a deep rocky section. The rod doubled over, I yanked it out of the holder, and the fish was gone before I could even get a hookset in. On the second fish I pitched a black/red jig up next to some shallow wood. I got bit and set into a solid fish. The fish got into the wood, I pulled too hard, and my 20 lb snapped. After dark I threw a 12 inch slammer and blades up and down the lake for a whole lot of nothing. I left at about 9:30PM.

11/20/2002 Coyote Reservoir Photos

I got to the lake a little before sunset. It was warm and dead calm the entire time I was there. I started off fishing lookout and 9lber pts with a senko. I had one fish munching on my senko at 9lber, but that was it until dark. Once it was dark I hit the dam once with a 12 inch slammer. Nothing. Then I went down and threw blades at the lookout area. I missed one fish there off a deep rockpile. Next I hit weedy pt and 9lber pt. I fished both these areas very thoroughly with plastics without a bump. Finally I hit the dam once more, this time with a 7 inch slammer. I had one 4.7 lber nose up and pull it under, otherwise no more activity. I left at about 10:30PM.

11/16/2002 Coyote Reservoir Photos

Launched my kickboat and started fishing a little after noon today. The

weather was warm without a wisp of wind all afternoon. There also was a nasty green algae slime floating on the surface in most areas, especially on the east shoreline. Basically it didn't look so good. I started out chucking swimbaits at the point across from the ramp but gave that up quickly because the of the conditions. Instead I tried dragging plastics deep and throwing a DD22. After about an hour working northwards the crankbait produced a 1.5 lber off a submerged tree. Next I crossed the lake and started working some steeper areas with a jig. I decided to put my spinning rod in my rod holder and drag a b-hog behind me as I worked the bank with the jig. I kept one eye on that rod as I threw the jig shallow. To my surprise the b-hog dragging behind me was constantly popping in and out of rock piles that I didn't realize even existed down there. I stared at my rod tip bouncing around for 15 minutes all the time thinking "it's going to get bit any minute" and it finally did. Turned out to be a nice chunky 6.7 pounder from about 20 feet of water. After catching this fish I went back over all those rock piles very deliberately with both the brush hog and heavy jig but didn't get any more fish off them. Somewhere to try this winter at any rate. A few minutes after giving up on the rockpiles I stuck another 1.5 lb fish up very shallow on a big jig. I eventually got to weedy pt. I thought for sure I could pick up at least a small one here but no luck. A little later I found some weed mats still covering water. I tied on a frog and worked them over slowly. On my second cast a 5 lber came half way out of the water in an explosive strike, but just knocked the frog to the side. That was it on the frog and for the rest of the afternoon. I hit several more good areas but didn't bit again. After sunset I loaded up my kickboat and headed to the dam for some night fishing. A bit of wind started going after dark and things were finally looking fishy. I started off throwing a 12 inch slammer on the dam. I pretty much picked apart the entire dam without any interest from the fish. But at the end I sent a final cast beside the spillway pipe. As the slammer neared shore it got sucked under by a big fish. I was in a bit of a tight spot with this fish. I was standing on the steep bank 10 feet above the waters surface. Since the fish hit fairly close to shore I was pulling nearly straight up on it. The fish was just wallowing endlessly on the surface. After considering my options I decided to just lean back as hard as I could, drag the fish across the surface and onto the bank, then jump down and grab it. Somehow it worked. It was a beautiful pot-bellied bass that went 11.7 pounds. After recovering from that fish I hit 9lber and lookout pts with the 12 inch. Looked good, but no more love on the plug. I left at about 9PM.

11/14/2002 Coyote Reservoir

Got to the lake a little before sunset. The water level is still dropping and the boat ramp has closed. The weather was very nice tonight, but there wasn't much to report. I fished until about 10:30 PM and never even got bit. I threw slammers, buzzbaits, jitterbugs, jigs and plastics. I guess those fish have to put you back in your place if you get to confident.

11/06/2002 Coyote Reservoir Photos

I got to the lake a little after 5PM. The first big storm of the year was supposed to arrive around midnight and the barometer was

plummeting. The weather was surprisingly nice out there when I arrived. Absolutely mirror calm. I was supposed to meet Rob at the dam at about 7 so I decided to try some main lake areas before he arrived. I started out at sandy point and worked all the way north to lookout point throwing a 9" Slammer. Nothing. At about 6 I headed to the dam. I stuck with the Slammer. A quarter of the way down the dam a chunky 4.3 pounder whacked it in a few feet of water. Another quarter of the way down the dam a 7.1 pounder grabbed it, also in very shallow water. This was more like the bite I was expecting! A few casts later I had a huge boil under the Slammer but the fish just didn't touch the lure. A couple more casts another fish hit it and missed, but I could tell this one must've been a small fish. About this time Rob arrived and we decided to give the dam a rest and hit some other spots. First we tried deep point for 20 minutes or so. Rob had a good boil on the slammer. I chucked a brush hog and had one dink tap-tap. Next we hit 9lber pt. Rob had missed a small one, and caught a 3lber both on the slammer. I didn't get touched on the b-hog. Next on the list was Lookout. Rob made one cast here and stuck a 8.2 pounder. By this time I had noticed an interesting pattern here. MS Slammer = fish. Brush hog = nothing. So I went back to my 9 inch Slammer. Sure enough within a half dozen casts a 5.8 pounder blasted it with 6 feet of line out. A few minutes later I sent the Slammer on a line drive at a big boulder and broke the bill. Smart move, I threw a 12 inch slammer for a little more here but didn't pick up anything more. Rob missed another blowup. Next we tried sandy point. I wasn't expecting much here and we only fished 10 minutes with no bites. Back to the dam. We were expecting a wild bite here, but instead it was very quiet until we reached the end of the dam. I finally picked up a 3 pounder on the brush hog. Rob stuck a 4.5 lber on the Slammer and missed another good blowup near the spillway, then picked up a small fish on a jig. After thoroughly working over this section again we went back to lookout for another 15 minutes. Nothing came up there so we called it a night at about midnight.

11/03/2002 Rancho Seco Lake Photos

Rob and I started out in his boat again at about 7AM. There was a little breeze early but it flattened out after about an hour. A clear, calm, hot day. We started out throwing swimbaits again. When we got to a good point I had a 7-8 lber follow inches underneath my castaic trout all the way back to the boat. We slowed down in this general area and had some more quality fish chase our baits, but they just wouldn't bite. For the next hour or two we didn't have any action. Not only that, we couldn't even find any sign of life, bass or redears. Even with flat water and 20 foot visibility. I had finally resigned to flipping a brush hog into weed mats when all of a sudden Rob hooked up to a good fish on the Generic swimbait. It was another absolutely flawless big bass. We both thought it would be in the 9 lb range, but it went 7lbs 10oz. These fish are in perfect health, but still a lot lighter than the fish you would get from San Pablo or even Coyote. We gave the swimbaits a lot of effort for the next several hours but couldn't get them to commit. We did find a few areas that were full of fish though. We had some good follows and probably spotted at least 20 more bass up to 10 pounds. They were just totally oblivious to us. We called it a day at about 1PM.

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Central San Francisco Bay

Description:

The central part of San Francisco Bay can be accessed from Redwood City. This is a fairly popular area for kayaks, a few canoes, some rowing teams and small sailboats. The boat ramp is reached from the Seaport exit off 101, and turn on Chesapeake Drive. I've launched here many times (probably at least 20 trips). There are a variety of tours one can do. Most of the best paddling is at half tide to high tide.

- 1. Out Redwood Creek to Corkscrew Slough, wind through Corkscrew to Steinberger Slough, back to Smith Slough, past several marinas and back to the dock. About 9 miles. Corkscrew Slough and Steinberger Slough do not have much of any water if the tide level is below 4 feet so a moderate tide is required! Most of this is very protected paddling but I have been through here with 25 MPH winds and it was rock and roll time.
- 2. Out Redwood Creek just before low water to the Bay. Eat breakfast on some sandy tidal islands out by channel marker #4. Take your time. As the water starts to rise and your island disappears, go north to Steinberger and return via Corkscrew or Smith Slough. 12 NM. The open Bay is quite rough at times but early in the morning it is usually very cooperative.
- Out Redwood Creek 1.1 NM, turn right at Greco Island (Westpoint Slough). Wind around through the Slough for a few miles and find the passageway to the Bay. Here's how. This is a well-kept secret until now. Westpoint turns south toward an abandoned sewage treatment plant and a park built on landfill. Go as if to keep the plant on your left, south toward the freeway. Then, look for a passageway, very narrow and hard to spot, heading left at about 115 magnetic. Following this will put the buildings on your right. The tide must be near 6 feet to make it through. Don't do this on a falling tide or you will get stuck. Slip on through to the Bay. Turn left at the powerlines and head northwest along the coast, where on a good day you will see seals and their pups, egrets, herons, grebes and all sorts of wildlife. Greco Island is both a hunting area and wildlife preserve (go it theoretically isn't allowed. You can extend this paddle quite a bit by

Wind and fog aren't the only atmospheric events on San Francisco Bay. 



If the lot is full, you and your guests are welcome to stop your cars in front of our building to unload your gear into our blue dockcarts, then park in one of the following areas:

- The closest (northern-most) row to Spinnaker Way in the lot adjacent to ours. Be careful not to park in the double-length spaces designated for vehicles towing boat trailers—you will be ticketed.
- Along Spinnaker Way
- Two lots over (east) from OCSC. This lot has ample spaces for cars and is only a three minute walk from OCSC.

We also ask that you please observe the fire lanes, and that you observe the Five (5) mile per hour speed limit through the boat yard and in the parking areas. The area around OCSC is a working boat yard; a number of people are present in the yard working in and around their boats, making speeding an unnecessary hazard.

On Saturday 11-30 captain Jim on the Happy Hooker reported even better action than the day before. Jim says the tides made a slight improvement and his catch doubled. Their 23 anglers boated 24 bass to 18 pounds, most in the 12 to 15 pound bracket. Jim has been a bit elusive on his exact location but from other reports we are receiving we would bet he was anchored up in the flats near the mouth of Montuzuma slough where we received several good reports from private boaters. The best action has been for boats soaking bullheads in 5 to 15 feet of water. Captain Jim on the Happy Hooker sat on the anchor on Friday 11-29 with his anglers soaking bullheads in lower Suisun bay. While the numbers were not big the stripers were with a dozen fish to 24 pounds landed by 25 anglers. Most were hens averaging a solid 12 to 15 pounds with several other opportunities lost and missed. Jim said a private boat anchored up right alongside them landed a bass in the mid 30s so there are some big pigs in the mix. Jim Smith is running out of Martinez and has lots of room available. A few sturgeon are being caught off the Mothball fleet but the best bite has been up in Montuzuma slough for anglers soaking roe at the Reed Barn. In the south bay there has been lots of anglers out trying but few stories of much success. Mike at the Oyster Point Bait, said folks fishing in his neighborhood are getting small sharks and rays, but there have been reports about sturgeon being caught across the Bay at Ballena Bay, near the Alameda Rock Wall and near Bay Farm Island.


